The FPA Flexible Fixed Income Fund ("Fund") performance is calculated on a total return basis which includes reinvestment of all distributions and is net of all fees and expenses. Fund returns do not reflect the deduction of taxes that a shareholder would pay on Fund distributions or the redemption of Fund shares, which would lower these figures. The Total Annual Fund Operating Expenses before reimbursement is 0.71% for the Institutional Share Class and 3.06% for the Advisor Share Class (as of most recent prospectus). First Pacific Advisors, LP (the "Adviser" or "FPA"), the Fund's investment adviser, has contractually agreed to reimburse the Fund for Total Annual Fund Operating Expenses (excluding interest, taxes, brokerage fees and commissions payable by the Fund in connection with the purchase or sale of portfolio securities, redemption liquidity service expenses, and extraordinary expenses, including litigation expenses not incurred in the Fund's ordinary course of business) in excess of 0.52% of the average net assets of the Fund attributable to the Institutional Class and 0.57% of the average the net assets of the Fund attributable to the Advisor Class for the one-year period ending April 30, 2023. During the term of the current expense limit agreement, beginning May 1, 2022 and ending April 30, 2023, any expenses reimbursed to the Fund by FPA during any of the previous 36 months may be recouped by FPA, provided the Fund's Total Annual Fund Operating Expenses do not exceed the then-applicable expense limit. Beginning May 1, 2023, any expenses reimbursed to the Fund by FPA during any of the previous 36 months may be recouped by FPA, provided the Fund's Total Annual Fund Operating Expenses do not exceed 0.64% of the average net assets of the Fund attributable to the Institutional Class and 0.74% of the average net assets of the Fund attributable to the Advisor Class for any subsequent calendar year, regardless of whether there is a then-effective higher expense limit. Contributors and Detractors¹

The largest contributors to performance during the quarter were the corporate holdings due to a combination of higher prices and coupon payments.² Overall, prices on corporate loans and bonds rose due to a decline in spreads and, for bonds, a decline in risk-free rates. The second largest contributors to performance were collateralized loan obligations (CLOs) backed by corporate loans with most of the return due to income from coupon payments. Most of these bonds are floating rate and have benefited from increases in their coupons as interest rates have risen. The third largest contributors to performance were recently issued residential mortgage-backed securities backed by non-performing single-family mortgages. Most of the return on these bonds was due to higher prices as a result of lower risk-free rates and lower spreads.

The only meaningful detractors from performance during the quarter were Treasury bonds. Though Treasury yields ended the quarter lower than where they started the quarter, yields increased at various points along the way. We periodically sold Treasuries over the past few months, using the proceeds to invest in other comparable duration investments. Some of those sales occurred at prices that were lower than the Fund's cost basis as a result of higher yields at the time of sale.

While there were other individual bonds that detracted from performance during the quarter, there were no other meaningful detractors at the sector level.

⁴ Collateralized mortgage obligations ("CMO") are mortgage-backed bonds that separate mortgage pools into different maturity classes. Commercial mortgage-backed securities ("CMBS") are securities backed by commercial mortgages rather than residential mortgages.

⁵ Yield to Worst ("YTW") is presented gross of fees and reflects the lowest possible yield on a callable bond without the issuer defaulting. It does not represent the yield an investor should expect to receive. As of March 31, 2023, the Fund's subsidized/unsubsidized 30-day SEC standardized yield ("SEC Yield") was 5.15%/5.01% respectively. The SEC Yield calculation is an annualized measure of the Fund's dividend and interest payments for the last 30 days, less the Fund expenses. Subsidized yield reflects fee waivers and/or expense reimbursements during the period. Without waivers and/or reimbursements, yields would be reduced. Unsubsidized yield does not adjust for any fee waivers and/or expense reimbursements in effect. The SEC Yield calculation shows investors what they would earn in yield over the course of a 12-month period if the Fund continued earning the same rate for the rest of the year.

Observations

Macroeconomic data during the quarter pointed toward lower future inflation. In addition, two bank failures in early March led to expectations that a contraction in credit would be disinflationary and avoid some of the Federal Reserve's anticipated monetary policy tightening. As a result, while the Federal Reserve instituted two 25 bps increases in the Fed Funds rate during the quarter, risk-free rates declined during the quarter for maturities longer than a year.⁶ Up until the bank failures, spreads declined across the market but then increased following the bank failures on concerns about contagion and weaker economic growth. Overall, investment grade debt spreads rose during the quarter while spreads on high yield rated debt declined.⁷ The net result is that yields across the bond market are generally lower than they were a few months ago. Due to lower spreads and yields in credit (investments rated BBB or lower), we are less excited about the opportunities there than we were a few months ago. Nevertheless, we continue to search for credit investments that we believe adequately compensate us for the risk of permanent impairment of capital. Barring those types of opportunities, we still see an attractive opportunity to buy longer duration, high quality bonds (rated single-A or higher) which we believe will enhance the Fund's long-term returns and the Fund's upside versus downside return profile.

Bloomberg U.S. Universal Bond Index represents the union of the following Bloomberg Barclay's indices: U.S. Aggregate Index, the U.S. Corporate High-Yield Index, the 144A Index, the Eurodollar Index, the Emerging Markets Index, and the non-ERISA portion of the CMBS Index. Municipal debt, private placements, and non-dollar-denominated issues are excluded from the Universal Index. The only constituent of the index that includes floating-rate debt is the Emerging Markets Index.

The **Consumer Price Index (CPI)** is an unmanaged index representing the rate of the inflation of U.S. consumer prices as determined by the U.S. Department of Labor Statistics. The CPI is presented to illustrate the Fund's purchasing power against changes in the prices of goods as opposed to a benchmark, which is used to compare the Fund's performance. There can be no guarantee that the CPI will reflect the exact level of inflation at any given time. This index reflects non-seasonally adjusted returns.

The **CPI + 200 bps** is created by adding 2% to the annual percentage change in the CPI. This index reflects non-seasonally adjusted returns.

Average Life (years) is the average length of time that each dollar of unpaid principal on a loan, a mortgage or an amortizing bond remains outstanding.

Basis Point (bps) is equal to one hundredth of one percent, or 0.01%. 100 basis points = 1%.

Credit Spread is the difference in yield between a U.S. Treasury bond and another debt security of the same maturity but different credit quality

Effective Duration (years) is the duration calculation for bonds with embedded options. Effective duration takes into account that expected cash flows will fluctuate as interest rates change.

A **fixed rate bond** is a bond that pays the same level of interest over its entire term.

A **floating-rate security** is an investment with interest payments that float or adjust periodically based upon a predetermined benchmark.

An **inverted yield curve** means that long-term interest rates are less than short-term interest rates. With an inverted yield curve, the yield decreases the farther away the maturity date is.

The **risk-free rate** reflects the yield of the Treasury bond matching the investment's duration.
