

Highlights

Primary investment objective is to seek maximum total return for shareholders from both capital appreciation and investment income to the extent consistent with protection of invested capital.

- Generally, under normal conditions, 50-70% of the Fund's assets will be allocated to equities, and 30-50% allocated to public and private credit of varying quality.
- The Fund will invest in public equities of large businesses from around the world (typically with market capitalizations in excess of \$10 billion).
- Absolute return focus - investments require a compelling risk/reward proposition on an absolute basis.
- Flexible approach - invest across capital structure, geographies, sectors and market caps. Allocation to fixed-income will increase in the absence of compelling equity opportunities.
- Deep research - independent, bottom-up, fundamental research process seeking to minimize risk.

The MSCI ACWI consists of 49 country indices comprising 23 developed and 26 emerging market country indices. Bloomberg U.S. Aggregate Bond Index provides a measure of the performance of the U.S. investment grade bonds market, which includes investment grade U.S. Government bonds, investment grade corporate bonds, mortgage pass-through securities and asset-backed securities that are publicly offered for sale in the United States. 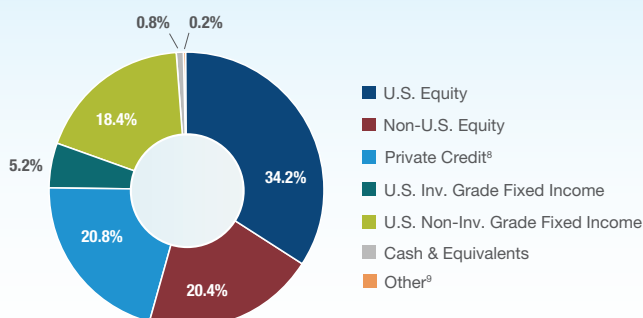

As of June 30, 2022, the Fund's subsidized/unsubsidized 30-Day standardized SEC yield ("SEC Yield") was 2.88%. The SEC Yield calculation is an annualized measure of the Fund's dividend and interest payments for the last 30 days, less Fund expenses. Subsidized yield reflects fee waivers and/or expense reimbursements during the period. Without waivers and/or reimbursements, yields would be reduced. Unsubsidized yield does not adjust for any fee waivers and/or expense reimbursements in effect. The SEC Yield calculation is based on the price of the Fund at the beginning of the month.

Fund Risks

Investing in closed-end funds involves risk, including loss of principal. Closed-end fund shares may frequently trade at a discount or premium to their net asset value. It is important to remember that there are risks inherent in any investment and there is no assurance that any investment or asset class will provide positive performance over time. Value style investing presents the risk that the holdings or securities may never reach our estimate of intrinsic value because the market fails to recognize what the portfolio management team considers the true business value or because the portfolio management team has misjudged those values. In addition, value style investing may fall out of favor and underperform growth or other style investing during given periods. Interest rate risk is when interest rates go up, the value of fixed income securities, such as bonds, typically go down and investors may lose principal value. Generally, the lower the quality rating of a security, the greater the risk that the issuer will fail to pay interest fully and return principal in a timely manner. If an issuer defaults the security may lose some or all its value.

The ratings agencies that provide ratings are Standard and Poor's, Moody's, and Fitch. Credit ratings range from AAA (highest) to D (lowest). Bonds rated BBB or above are considered investment grade. Credit ratings of BB and below are lower-rated securities (junk bonds). High-yielding, non-investment grade bonds (junk bonds) involve higher risks than investment grade bonds. Bonds with credit ratings of CCC or below have high default risk.

Investing in Special Purpose Acquisition Companies ("SPACS") involves risks. Because SPACs and similar entities have no operating history or ongoing business other than seeking acquisitions, the value of their securities is particularly dependent on the ability of the entity's management to identify and complete a profitable acquisition. SPACs are not required to provide the depth of disclosures or undergo the rigorous due diligence of a traditional initial public offering (IPO). Other risks include but are not limited to: SPACs may not be able to identify an acquisition target; an acquisition target may not get approved by SPAC shareholders or shareholders may not have sufficient voting power to disapprove a SPAC transaction; an acquisition may prove unsuccessful; an investment in a SPAC may lose value; SPACs may be considered illiquid or be subject to restrictions on resale; and an investment in a SPAC may be diluted by additional offerings.

Private placement securities are securities that are not registered under the federal securities laws, and are generally eligible for sale only to certain eligible investors. Private placements may be illiquid, and thus more difficult to sell, because there may be relatively few potential purchasers for such investments, and the sale of such investments may also be restricted under securities laws.

The Fund may use leverage. While the use of leverage may help increase the distribution and return potential of the Fund, it also increases the volatility of the Fund's net asset value (NAV), and potentially increases volatility of its distributions and market price. There are costs associated with the use of leverage, including ongoing dividend and/or interest expenses. There also may be expenses for issuing or administering leverage. Leverage changes the Fund's capital structure through the issuance of preferred shares and/or debt, both of which are senior to the common shares in priority of claims. If short-term interest rates rise, the cost of leverage will increase and likely will reduce returns earned by the Fund's common stockholders.
